1. Short description

In today's education and training landscape, the ability to navigate and leverage digital environments has become an essential skill. The "*Digital collaboration spaces: sharing information with learners*" module is designed to provide trainers and mentors with the practical and strategic skills needed to create and manage collaborative learning spaces in the digital world. We will explore how to select and use the most suitable tools for distance learning and master the main videoconferencing platforms. We will also analyze the specific opportunities offered by the platforms made available by E+, crucial for collaboration and knowledge sharing at the EU level. The goal is to transform distance into an opportunity for connection, making learning dynamic and inclusive.

- **Manage and optimize** the advanced features of leading videoconferencing platforms to conduct interactive, dynamic, and engaging sessions.
- **Exploit** the resources and opportunities offered by Erasmus+ platforms, enhancing collaboration and knowledge exchange at the EU level.
- **Design** online learning environments that promote active participation, inclusion, and meaningful connection among participants.

3 Digital collaboration spaces: sharing the information with learners

3.1 Distance Learning tools

Distance learning tools support students and teachers in collaborating, communicating, and creating content during and after the course. Platforms such as Google Classroom, Microsoft Teams, and Moodle allow sharing materials, participating in discussions, and assessing learning. Tools such as Zoom or Meet promote synchronous lessons, while quiz and feedback apps encourage active interaction and progress monitoring.

3.1.1 Collaboration tools: Google Drive, Trello, Asana, Teams

In mentoring, effective collaboration between mentor and student is key to building a structured and productive growth path. The first module focuses on the use of digital tools to facilitate sharing materials, organizing activities, and managing projects. Specifically, **Google Drive**, **Trello**, **Asana**, and **Microsoft Teams** will be explored.

Google Drive is one of the most popular tools for storing and sharing documents in the cloud. Using Docs, Sheets, and Slides, mentors and students can collaborate in real time, editing and commenting on files, always maintaining an up-to-date version of the material. The ability to structure shared folders allows for a centralized archive of the mentoring process, promoting order and transparency.

Trello (<https://trello.com/>) is a visual project management platform based on the Kanban method. It allows you to create thematic boards, to-do lists, and detailed cards for each task. For a mentor, Trello is useful for assigning tasks, tracking deadlines, and visualizing progress in a clear and intuitive way. Each card can include checklists, file attachments, comments, and deadlines, making it easier for the student to manage their projects independently.

Asana (<https://asana.com/>) offers a more structured project management framework. In addition to Kanban-style views, it allows you to create calendars, task dependencies, and automatic reporting. It's ideal for more complex mentorships, where medium- to long-term goals need to be tracked, with the option to integrate customized objectives and KPIs.

Finally, **Microsoft Teams** is an integrated platform that combines communication, file sharing, and workgroup management. Its added value lies in the ability to centralize



collaboration: each team can have thematic channels, shared folders, dedicated chats, and access to tools like OneNote for shared note-taking. Integration with the Office suite makes it particularly useful in corporate and institutional contexts.

This chapter includes hands-on e-learning activities, where each participant can try creating and managing their own Trello board, a project in Asana, a shared folder in Google Drive, and a collaborative space in Teams. The goal is to empower mentors to use these tools independently.

3.1.2 Contents creation tools: Canva, Prezi, Power Point

The ability to create clear, engaging, and structured content is a critical skill for any mentor. Whether presenting a concept, sharing a thought, or providing study materials, having the right tools makes communication more effective and memorable. In this module, we'll focus on three key platforms: Canva, Prezi, and PowerPoint.

Canva is an online graphic design tool that allows even novices to create visually engaging content. It offers a wide range of templates for presentations, infographics, posters, resumes, factsheets, and much more. For mentors, Canva is useful for creating customized materials to share with students, supporting learning through a visual approach. The use of colors, icons, and images facilitates understanding and makes content more motivating.

Prezi, unlike traditional linear presentations, allows for dynamic and interactive storytelling. Concepts are not presented sequentially, but rather develop through a visual path that guides the audience's attention in a fluid manner. This approach is particularly suitable for explaining complex processes, relationships between concepts, or for greater student engagement. Prezi's zoomable structure allows you to move from an overview to the details with great communicative effectiveness.

PowerPoint, although the most traditional tool, remains a cornerstone for creating professional presentations. Mastering its more advanced features, such as the use of transitions, animations, speaker notes, and custom templates, improves the quality and impact of communication. Furthermore, PowerPoint is easily integrated into business or educational settings and is compatible with many videoconferencing and sharing platforms.

Exercise: participants will create original content using each of the three tools, learning not only the technical features but also the principles of design and visual communication. Upon completion, each mentor will have built a small creative "toolbox," useful for creating effective, aesthetically pleasing materials that meet mentoring objectives.

3.1.3 Asynchronous communication tools: Forum, email, chat

Asynchronous communication is a crucial component to ensure continuity, flexibility and inclusiveness in a mentoring process. This module aims to provide mentors with

the tools and skills to establish an effective dialogue with students even outside of real-time meetings. The most commonly used tools for asynchronous communication will be analyzed: forums, email and chat.

Forums represent a structured form of asynchronous communication that allows the exchange of ideas on specific topics, with the advantage of being able to keep track of discussions over time. In a mentoring process, forums can be used to ask questions, share materials, stimulate peer discussion and develop thematic reflections. The written and permanent nature of these tools encourages in-depth study and reasoned participation.

Email remains one of the most widespread and versatile tools for formal asynchronous communication. It is useful for sending updates, setting goals, sharing documents and providing detailed feedback. Good use of email includes a clear subject, concise content, use of short paragraphs and a professional but empathetic communication style. Guidelines will be provided on how to write effective emails and respect response times.

Chats (WhatsApp, Telegram, Slack, Teams) offer more immediate, yet still asynchronous, communication, useful for day-to-day coordination, quick idea sharing, or encouraging informal interaction.

Among these, WhatsApp is often the most widely used tool for reaching bivalve farmers; for this reason, the module will also provide specific tips for its effective use in training contexts, such as establishing clear boundaries, structuring group conversations, and using it to reinforce key messages without overwhelming participants. In general, for any type of chat, it's important to establish shared rules of use to avoid information overload or interference with students' concentration and work schedules.

Exercises on asynchronous communication: the mentor will encourage course participants to reflect on the advantages and limitations of asynchronous communication. Real-world situations will be simulated using various types of chat. Practical examples will be provided:

- Using WhatsApp and WhatsApp Web: creating a group, polling, sending files, and connecting to a desktop.
- Message templates.
- Strategies for maintaining group participant engagement.
- Suggestions for integrating asynchronous and synchronous communication.

3.1.4 Tools for evaluation: Google Forms, Kahoot

Evaluation is an essential component of the mentoring process, as it allows you to monitor the progress of the path, verify the achievement of objectives and provide constructive feedback. The fourth module is dedicated to digital tools that can facilitate

effective, interactive and participatory evaluation. In particular, we will explore the features of Google Forms and Kahoot!.

Google Forms is a free tool from Google that allows you to create surveys, tests, questionnaires and feedback forms. It is extremely useful for assessing prior knowledge, monitoring learning, collecting opinions and verifying student satisfaction. The forms can be customized with open-ended, closed-ended, multiple-choice or Likert scale questions.

The results are automatically collected in a spreadsheet, allowing for immediate and orderly analysis. In the context of mentorship, Google Forms can be used to carry out an initial, intermediate and final evaluation, thus structuring an evidence-based learning process.

Kahoot! is a game-based learning platform that allows you to create interactive, stimulating and fun quizzes.

Thanks to its playful format, Kahoot! can be used to actively involve students in reviewing content, verifying understanding of specific topics, or making group meetings more dynamic.

Quizzes can be taken live or asynchronously, and the results are available in real time, allowing the mentor to adapt the path to the students' training needs.

During the module, participants will learn to design assessment tools consistent with the objectives of their mentoring path, acquiring practical skills in creating and analyzing modules.

We will also reflect on the meaning of assessment as a moment of dialogue and growth, rather than judgment. Formative assessment, self-assessment, and mutual assessment approaches will be explored.

At the end, each mentor will be able to effectively integrate assessment tools into their mentorship process, adopting a conscious, transparent approach oriented towards the development of the student's potential.

3.2 Be able to use the different platforms for video conference and select the most adapt to the target group

3.2.1 Comparison of video conferencing tools: Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Google Meet (audio/video quality, screen sharing, collaboration features)

In the post-Covid era of digital collaboration and hybrid work, video conferencing tools have become essential pillars of communication, productivity, and remote learning. Among the numerous options available, Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and Google Meet stand out as industry giants, each with its own unique features, strengths, weaknesses, and ideal use cases.

Understanding the differences between these platforms is crucial to choosing the right solution for your needs, whether for work meetings, online classes, or informal gatherings.

Zoom: The Pioneer of Accessibility and Feature-Richness

Zoom has gained meteoric popularity thanks to its extraordinary ease of use and intuitive interface. It is often the preferred choice for quick meetings, large webinars, and virtual events, as it is reliable even with large numbers of participants.

Its strengths include:

It offers a comprehensive set of interactive meeting tools, such as separate meeting rooms, integrated polls, advanced virtual whiteboards, non-verbal reactions, and the ability to easily change the virtual background.

Generally stable even on slower connections, ensuring good audio and video quality. It excels at managing events with hundreds or thousands of participants, with specific features for presenters and audiences.

Advanced recording features, including the ability to record to the cloud.

Despite its versatility, Zoom's free version has time limitations for group meetings, and some users initially raised privacy concerns, which the company has attempted to address with ongoing security updates.

Microsoft Teams: the collaboration hub for the Microsoft ecosystem

Microsoft Teams is positioned not just as a video conferencing tool, but as a true collaboration hub, part of the Microsoft 365 suite, where you can open project folders and share documents. It is the ideal solution for companies and institutions that already use Microsoft and are looking for a unified environment for communication, project management, and document sharing.

Its main advantages are:

- It integrates seamlessly with Word, Excel, PowerPoint, SharePoint, Outlook, and other Microsoft services, allowing real-time document editing and sharing directly within the platform.
- It offers dedicated "Teams" and "Channels," which allow you to organize conversations, files, and meetings for specific projects or departments, promoting structured collaboration.
- It is particularly robust in terms of security, compliance, and user management, crucial for large organizations.
- It features persistent chat and integrated 1:1 or group voice/video calling.

Its rich functionality can sometimes make it less intuitive for new users than Zoom, and its performance can be more impacted by slow internet connections or less powerful hardware.

Starting May 5, 2025, Microsoft will end support for Skype, prompting users to migrate to Microsoft Teams. Teams will offer all the features you're used to with Skype, such as chat and calling, but will integrate them into a much richer and more versatile environment.

Google Meet: Simplicity for the Google Ecosystem

Google Meet is Google's answer to video conferencing. Deeply integrated into the Google Workspace ecosystem (Gmail, Google Calendar, Google Drive), it is renowned for its simplicity, reliability, and accessibility, often representing the natural choice for those who already regularly use Google services.

Its strengths include:

- Meetings can be started and joined with a single click directly from Calendar or Gmail, without the need to download additional software for the web version.
- Seamless integration with Google Calendar (scheduling), Google Drive (file sharing), and other Google services, making it efficient for ecosystem users.
- Designed for reliability and scalability, it supports a large number of participants with excellent video and audio quality.
- It offers the basic features needed for video conferencing (screen sharing, chat, recording), with a clean interface free of excessive distractions.

Compared to Zoom or Teams, Google Meet may lack advanced features for interactive collaboration (such as breakout rooms or native polls in the basic version), but its strength lies precisely in its simplicity and deep integration with Google's everyday productivity tools.

In conclusion, the choice of virtual communications platform between Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and Google Meet is intrinsically linked to the specific needs of the user or organization.

In summary, **Zoom** stands out for its remarkable ease of use and wealth of interactive features. These characteristics make it the ideal solution for large-scale webinars, dynamic virtual events, and meetings that require a high level of participant engagement.

Microsoft Teams emerges as the preferred solution for companies seeking a unified collaboration environment. Its deep integration with the Microsoft 365 suite, combined with a strong emphasis on team management and data security, positions it as an essential tool for business productivity.

Finally, **Google Meet** is characterized by its simplicity, broad accessibility, and seamless integration into the Google Workspace ecosystem. This makes it an excellent choice for quick and efficient communications, particularly advantageous for users and organizations already operating in the Google environment.

The [eTwinning platform](#) is more than a platform; it is a vibrant community of schools that promotes collaborative projects between schools from different countries through the strategic use of digital technologies. Launched in 2005 as an initiative of the European Commission (EC), eTwinning is managed by European Schoolnet on behalf of the EC and is supported by National Support Services in each country.

This platform allows teachers and students to collaborate, share, and develop key transversal skills in a safe, multilingual, and stimulating digital environment.

E-Twinning offers an environment for distance learning or blended learning, providing:

- **Tools for synchronous and asynchronous collaboration:** from chat to forums, from document sharing to collaborative pads, the TwinSpace (a closed and secure virtual environment for projects) facilitates remote group work.
- **Digital skills development:** using the platform, creating digital content, and communicating online inherently improve teachers' and students' digital skills, in line with the EU Digital Education Action Plan (2021-2027).
- **Language learning in real-world contexts:** communicating in a multilingual environment enhances language skills in an authentic and meaningful way.
- **Access to resources and professional development:** eTwinning Live, the professional social network, is a hub for exchanging ideas, accessing innovative pedagogical resources, and participating in online professional development courses, webinars, and discussions. Many of these courses are specifically designed to integrate digital technologies into teaching.
- **Flexibility and inclusion:** eTwinning projects can be adapted to different education levels and student populations, including those with fewer opportunities, making international learning accessible to all.

The eTwinning platform is structured into various sections, including:

- **TwinSpace:** this is the heart of collaborative work. It is a private and secure virtual environment where teachers and their students can work together with project partners, upload materials, create pages, use communication tools (forums, chat, video conferencing), and manage project activities. This space complies with the highest standards of privacy and data security.

- **Institutional support desk:** managed by the European Schoolnet Central Support Service and the National Support Services (NSO), it ensures registration validation, the promotion of eTwinning in their respective countries, support for teachers in creating and managing projects, and the organization of training sessions.

Numerous impact studies and research have demonstrated the significant pedagogical impact of eTwinning. In general, have demonstrated how this platform:

- **Fosters active and cooperative learning:** students actively collaborate with peers from other countries and cultures, developing critical thinking, problem-solving, and communication skills.
- **Improves digital and linguistic skills:** constant use of the platform and the need to communicate in a foreign language (often EN) significantly enhance these skills.
- **Increases motivation and critical thinking:** participation in international projects increases student engagement and encourages them to think more deeply about multidisciplinary topics.
- **Fosters intercultural awareness:** Working with peers from diverse backgrounds enriches understanding of other cultures and promotes mutual respect.

The [E+ Project Results Platform](#) (E+PR platform) is a public, centralized database that collects and makes accessible the products, results, and good practices generated by projects funded under the various Erasmus+ Key Actions (KA1, KA2, KA3). Its primary function is to provide an "official showcase" for consulting the objectives, partners involved, materials produced, and impact summaries of each project. This platform is an invaluable resource for e-learning and innovative distance learning because:

- **It serves as a source of methodological inspiration:** it allows professionals and educational teams to explore successful projects, replicating positive experiences, adapting them to their own contexts. It contains Open Educational Resources (OER) and methodologies directly applicable to distance learning or blended learning.
- **It helps disseminate and reuse good practices:** it connects project results with potential users, optimizing the reuse of resources created with public funding. This is particularly relevant for the creation of e-learning modules, digital teaching materials, and online training courses.
- **It contributes to ongoing and institutional training:** It offers concrete and documented examples of technological and pedagogical innovation applicable to educational contexts at different levels (from school to university, from vocational training to adult education). Teachers can draw on these experiences to enrich their teaching practices and develop new online learning modules.

→ **It supports research and development:** Researchers and policymakers can analyze project data to identify trends, best practices, and areas for improvement in education and training at the European level.

eTwinning and E+PR platform are not isolated tools, but interconnected strategic components of the E+ digital ecosystem. While eTwinning activates and supports collaborative projects in real time, the E+PR platform amplifies their impact, ensuring effective dissemination. Through these platforms, the following are promoted:

- Networked learning: creation of communities of practice and continuous exchange between education professionals.
- Developing digital skills: essential for navigating and thriving in the contemporary educational landscape.
- Using active methodologies: which place the student at the center of the learning process, even in online contexts.
- These efforts contribute significantly to the European goal of inclusive and internationalized education, as outlined in the European Education Area and the Digital Education Action Plan.

eTwinning and E+ Project Results platforms are, therefore, complementary tools of enormous pedagogical value. Both enrich digital teaching, promote the internationalization of curricula, and strengthen the EU teaching community. With a well-defined strategy and adequate training ([here](#)), mentors can transform these platforms into useful tools for innovating their classrooms and developing key skills.

It is essential, however, that their use be supported by training that includes:

Continuous mentors' training: to develop the skills necessary for the effective use of platforms and the integration of innovative methodologies.

Technical capacity: to ensure that schools have adequate digital infrastructure.

Adequate evaluation: to monitor the impact and continuously improve the effectiveness of initiatives.

In short, these platforms are not just technological tools, but true pedagogical ecosystems that have the goal and power to transform European educational practices, serving as a model for other education systems worldwide.
